ZERO CONDITIONAL

The zero conditional is the FACTUAL or the REAL conditional.

We use it to talk about facts, general truths, habits, rules and instructions that are the RESULT of something else happening first.

if/when + present simple, present simple

- When the sun sets, it gets dark.
- If it's cold, light the fire.
- If you leave milk out, it spoils.
- Children can swim, if an adult is with them.

FIRST CONDITIONAL

The first conditional talks about POSSIBLE FUTURE results... Things that are likely to happen... But there is still a chance that they may not happen.

We use the first conditional to talk about predictions, superstitions, plans, promises offers, suggestions, warnings and instructions... that are the RESULT of something else happening first.


if/when + present simple, will + infinitive

- If you don't eat now, you will be hungry later.
- When the sun sets, it will get cold. Using 'when' means that I am very confident that the action in the 'if' clause will happen.

SECOND CONDITIONAL

We use the second conditional to talk about things in the future that are UNLIKELY to happen or things that are IMPOSSIBLE in the present.

We use it to 1) imagine life is different; 2) to ask hypothetical questions; 3) to give advice; and 4) to give reasons why.

if/when + past simple , would + infinitive

If I had enough money, I'd buy a house.

- How would she earn money if she moved to London?
- If I were you, I'd talk to my boss before I quit my job.
- If I had the money, I'd lend it to you.

We use the third conditional to talk about an UNREAL past.

We use it to IMAGINE a situation in the past (a different one to what happened in reality) and the imaginary result. It's often used 1) to express regret about the past; 2) when we wish we could change something in the past; and 3) to scold someone for something they did in the past.

If I had taken better care of myself, I wouldn't have got sick.

He'd have got the job if he hadn't been so nervous in the interview.

If she had replied to my message, I wouldn't have been so worried.

You showed up at a dinner party empty-handed. Everybody else brought a dish to the party! You wish that you had brought something but you didn't know that you were supposed to.

He was talking on the phone while driving. He crashed his car. He's OK, but regrets using his phone in the car.

Situation 4

A woman went on a hike. She didn't bring a rain jacket. It started raining. She was upset because she got very wet.

MIXED CONDITIONALS

Mixed conditionals help you to 'move through time' by using different time references in each clause. These are the two most common time combinations used in mixed conditional sentences:

past action + present result:

if + past perfect, would + infinitive

If I had saved more money, I would own this house.

present condition + past result:

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if + past simple, + perfect conditional

[perfect conditional] is subject + would + have + past participle

If I were more outgoing, I would have introduced myself.





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MIXED CONDITIONAL PRACTICE
